So I saw Zachary in the incubator, and watching my son diaper this child—and the baby was tiny—and deal with the wires and the whole thing, was just one of the most amazing things I had ever experienced. You never know what your children are going to be like when they're in that situation, and he was just so amazing with the baby.

Most gratifying accomplishment: I know other people say this, but I think I have three of the most terrific sons that ever walked the Earth. I not only love them but I like them. They're truly terrific people. I think that's a tremendous accomplishment. And I think this job has been a tremendous boost and something that I think I've grown with a lot.

That really is a fear—getting to the point where life isn't fun but you're still chugging along, and you make other people around you unhappy. I don't want to do that to my children.

One of your most memorable vacations: I kind of have two. One is this China trip. I think that will stick with me for a very long time. China was just so different from any place I had ever been. The other one was a cruise we did in July of 2001 with nine of my husband's cousins, who he grew up with, but we hadn't spent any time with them as adults, so it could have been heaven or hell. We did a Mediterranean cruise, and then we spent four extra days in Rome. I think there are probably nail marks in the [Leonardo] da Vinci Airport because they had to drag me out of there. My husband actually held on to my passport for six months because he thought I'd turn around and go back.

Biggest pet peeve: I don't like rude people, and I don't like people who are so self-centered they really can't see other people's needs and wants. Narcissistic people tick me off.

Qualities you like most in a person: I like people who are real and genuine, who can laugh at themselves, who are fun to be with and enjoy laughing. People who are interested in having a good time and having some fun; life's too short not to.

Qualities you like least: People who just don't look beyond themselves. Again, it's that self-centered, "look at me first" and "I matter most." And people who have no patience. Occasionally, I have to say, I'm one of those, but I think patience is one of those things that most of us just don't have enough of.
